PASTOR'S COLUMM—A WORD ON PRAYER

I remember the first time I heard someone teach that we are commanded to pray. It was when I was in middle school youth group. We were talking about how prayer is an ongoing conversation with God that we get to engage in. Also, we had to do it because it was one of the "marks of a believer." What a great weight this put on me! "I must pray," I thought. "I must show myself to be a believer!"

When my wife and I started attending a Free Lutheran Church, I thought that I should figure out what these Free Lutherans believe. My pastor suggested I read the Small Catechism and the Augsburg Confession. It was while reading these two historical confessions that I discovered I was Lutheran.

Faith in Jesus Christ saved me. God was gracious. I believed he maintained my faith and that my works had nothing to do with my salvation. I was 100% assured of my salvation because of this, so much so that during college, a CRU staff worker called me, "A cocky Christian."


However, my thoughts about prayer hadn't substantially changed. I was still concerned with showing my faith through prayer.

After attending a Free Lutheran church for a couple years, I began reading Luther's Large Catechism. In it, Luther teaches that God, in commanding His people to not use His name in vain, is also commanding them to call upon His name rightly. My thoughts about prayer were confirmed. I must pray. Luther wrote, "Prayer is just as strictly and seriously commanded as all other commandments: to have no other God, not to kill, not to steal, and so on. Let no one think that it makes no difference whether he prays or not." "Wow," I thought. Prayer is pretty serious if neglecting prayer is a sin!

I have a whole lot of confessing to do because my prayer is lacking in so many ways, whether you want to go by quantity or quality!

But then there was a beautiful teaching that I hadn't ever comprehended before. This teaching is found in the Psalms, "Call upon me in the day of trouble; I will deliver you, and you shall glorify me." (Psalm 50:15, ESV) And, it is also found in Matthew, "Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives, and the one who seeks finds, and to the one who knocks it will be opened." (Matthew 7:7–8, ESV)

God makes promises to His people when they pray. He promises to hear our prayers and to answer our prayers. Maybe this is something you have heard before. I know I had heard it. But I dismissed it. I had all sorts of prayers that were not answered, I thought. But here, God promises to hear and answer. Why wouldn't I then trust Him at His Word? He does hear. He does answer. How do I know? Because He says He does.

These promises, Luther points out, are so that we are all the more encouraged and stirred up to pray. But not only this, God steps in and even gives us the words to pray. God is so gracious to us that he opens our lips that we would declare his praise. When the disciples came to Jesus, not knowing how they should pray, He said, "Pray then like this: "Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil." (Matthew 6:9–13, ESV)

I never comprehended how beautiful and complete this prayer was. God said, these are the exact things for which you should pray. But God doesn't stop there. He also gives us prayer throughout the scriptures, especially in the Psalms. In the scriptures, we have the exact words that God uses to teach us to pray.

That doesn't mean we can only pray words from scripture, but it does probably mean that is where we should start when we ask the question, "What is prayer?"

This brings me back to my original thought. One of the things that has been impressed upon me lately is the imperfect nature of not only my works but also my prayer. Though my works are imperfect and often filled with self-interest, Jesus perfects them so that they are truly good. The same is true of my prayer. My prayers are too infrequent and often lacking in depth. Yet, my feeble and imperfect prayers are graciously heard by God the Father, perfected by Jesus Christ, and answered for His sake.

My prayers therefore are not my striving to prove my faith but instead they are confession of my weakness. Prayer confesses my utter inability to do what I want or need to do. Prayer is confessing full reliance upon God's grace even for the smallest things in life. I don't pray to prove my faith. I can't. I pray because Jesus has saved me and I can do nothing apart from Him. I go to him in prayer because He has the words of eternal life.

OLD THEOLOGY BOOK QUOTE OF THE MONTH

Which Doctrine, Then, or Which Word, Ought a Minister Set Before the Church of God?

Neither his dreams, nor the visions of his heart, or whatever seemed good or right to him (Jer 23:16, 25); also not human traditions or ordinances (Is 29:13; Mt 15:9). But let him who teaches in the church teach the Word of God (1 Ptr 4:11), so that the heart of the ministry is and remains this, Is 59:21: "I have put My words in your mouth," and as Augustine aptly says: "Let us not hear in the church: I say this, you say this, he says that; but: Thus says the Lord."
